A special meeting of the Crosslake City Council was called to order in the City Hall by Mayor Fogelberg at 7:35 P.M. on March 28, 1977. Present, in addition to the Mayor, were Councilmen Benson, Arends, Andolshek, Olson and City Clerk Whisler. Also present were nine members of the community. The primary purpose of the meeting was to act on a resolution relating to the \$1,374,000 Telephone Utility Bond; providing for prepayment of Telephone System Bonds, dated as of December 1, 1961; rescinding the Dec. 23, 1961 resolution as of June 1, 1977.

The Mayor turned the chair over to Mrs. Andolshek who explained the resolution then moved its adoption. Benson seconded the motion. All voted "AYE". Motion carried. A copy of this resolution is on file with the City Clerk.

The Mayor then resumed the chair.

The City Clerk read a letter from Police Officer Luke Gallagher in which he announced his resignation. Olson moved the resignation be accepted. Andolshek seconded the motion. All voted "AYE". Motion carried.

Al Kelley again approached the Council asking why he had not yet been granted 3.2 beer and set-up licenses.

Councilman Olson moved that an ordinance be adopted allowing an unlimited number of such licenses. Arends seconded the motion. When the vote was called for, Andolshek and Benson abstained. The motion was lost for want of a majority vote.


Olson then moved that the one-day beer license for July 3, 1977 which had been granted to the Fire Department be rescinded. Arends seconded the motion. When the vote was called for, Andolshek and Benson abstained. The motion was lost for lack of a majority vote.

Mr. Kelley then asked that the City Attorney be instructed to contact the State Attorney General asking for a ruling on the legality of Ordinance 8A. Andolshek moved the Clerk be so instructed. Olson seconded the motion. All voted "AYE". The Mayor directed the Clerk to contact City Attorney Fritz.

Councilman Olson expressed the opinion that all businesses be licensed. Benson suggested Olson be appointed to investigate the possibilities of such action. The Mayor appointed Olson to conduct such an investigation.

Speaking for the Roads Commission, Arends said that City roads should be limited to four tons, and that a notice should be placed in the official newspaper to that effect.

Andolshek moved that the meeting be adjourned. Benson seconded the motion. All voted "AYE". Meeting was adjourned at 8:20 P.M.
