

March 31, 1975

This duly called special session of the Crosslake City Council was called to order by Mayor Fogelberg at 2:00 P.M. at City Hall. Present were Councilman Olson, Foss, Andolshek, Peterson and Clerk Perkins,

Councilman Peterson moved, with second by Andolshek, for the Clerk to write a letter to the Conifer Labs, informing them that they have seven days to pay the \$1050.00 rent due or the City will place the matter in the City Attorney's hands for legal action. The letter is to be sent by certified mail to obtain a receipt. The payment is to be a certified or cashiers check. All voting aye.

Note: The letter was sent 4/1/75 and receipt returned for files. Attorney Vigoren suggested allowing until 4/10/75 (10 days) before bringing legal action.

Mayor Fogelberg reported the Preapplication for the federal grant had been denied. It was her opinion that the Council should seriously look toward purchasing the Pasteur property.

Councilman Olson moved, with second by Foss, that Fogelberg and Peterson explore purchase of the Pasteur property with Mike Hammergren, the realator now listing the property. All voting aye.

The League of Minicipalities was called and it was determined that no public hearings were necessary if the Council felt the purchase of the property was necessary for future City needs and funds were available without need for a bond issue.

Councilman Foss moved, with second by Olson, that the Clerk open a daily interest account at Lakeland State Bank and be authorized to transfer funds to this account from checking to maximise interest earnings on all City funds. The Clerk shall transfer to and from the account at his discretion and then report all transactions to the Council and the reasons therefore. All voting aye.

Councilman Foss reported that the City Attorney recommended that all bad checks in amounts under \$100.00 be taken by the individual to Conciliation Court in Brainerd. No action was taken, however, it was agreed this would be the instruction to those so affected and the City Attorney would not be authorized to handle these cases.

The Clerk was asked to determine what ordinances, if any, were presently on the City books pertaining to nuisances such as unsightly areas, garbage, roaming dogs, etc.

Councilman Foss moved, with second by Andolshek, to adjourn at 4:40 P.M. Carried,
