

June 17, 1976

A special meeting of the Crosslake City Council was called to order by Mayor Fogelberg at 2:00 P.M. on June 17, 1976, in the City Hall. Present were Councilmen Olson, Foss, Peterson and Clerk Whisler. Andolshek who was attending a funeral in Saint Paul was unable to attend. There were also five members of the community in attendance.

The Mayor read a letter from Zoning Coordinator Jan Mezzenga, dated June 12, 1976, which contained the following information:

"This A.M. the members of the Planning Commission again met with Mr. Jack Stone at his place of business to discuss another location for his proposed bumper cars. This new location would be adjacent to the present miniature golf course with a five-foot spacing. A cyclone fence must be installed around the bumper car pad. The moon walk will be moved to the southwest corner of his home, on the east side of the miniature golf course. The Planning Commission recommends the City Council's approval."

After much discussion, Councilman Peterson moved that the Council approve the Planning Commission's decision. Foss seconded the motion. All voted "AYE". Motion carried.


The Clerk was instructed to set up a meeting for next week with the surrounding communities to discuss the future of Ambulance service in the area.

The Clerk announced that he had contacted Ideal Township, and that they stated they intend sending \$25.00 a month to the Ambulance fund.

The next item of business was a discussion of a salary raise for Patrick Hoag. Councilman Foss read a report of salaries being paid in surrounding communities for comparable work. Olson then moved that Hoag's salary remain the same. The motion was seconded by Foss. All voted "AYE". Motion carried. (Foss suggested that, if and when Hoag took over snowplowing duties, further thought might be given to a pay raise for him.)

Councilman Foss reported that, in contacting Region V, he learned that it would be doubtful if the City could ever recover what had already been spent in improving the old dump site, however, the City was encouraged to make a preliminary application for a grant. Foss quoted statistics from the 1975 applications granted that were encouraging.

Peterson moved, at 2:35 P.M., that the meeting be adjourned. Olson seconded the motion. All voted "AYE". Motion carried.
