The regular meeting of the Crosslake City Council was called to order in the City Hall at 7:30 P.M. on September 10, 1976 by Mayor Fogelberg. Present were Councilmen Olson, Andolshek, Foss, Petersen, Clerk Whisler and Attorney Fritz. Also in attendance were eleven members of the community.

Olson moved that the minutes of the August 27th meeting be accepted as written. Andolshek seconded the motion. All voted "AYE". Motion carried.

On a motion by Andolshek with a second by Petersen, all voting "AYE", the Treasurer's financial Report for the City was approved.

On a motion by Petersen with a second by Andolshek, all voting "AYE", the Treasurer's Financial Report for the Telephone Company was approved.

Reporting for the Telephone Commission, Andolshek announced that 365 ballots had been cast on the question of updating the telephone system. 295 were "AYE" votes and 70 were "NO" votes. This amounts to a favorable response of 80.8%. She also told of an interesting and informative telephone meeting that she had attended at the Saint Paul Athletic Club. This meeting had dealt in great part with extended area service. Mrs. Andolshek stated that the Minnesota Telephone Association was going to approach the Public Service Commission with ideas on an extended area service discount toll plan.

Petersen, reporting for the Cemetery Commission, told of the death and interment of Dean Schliek. Olson told of the case of a party who had purchased a grave site in January 1962 but through an oversight had not yet paid for it. Olson wanted to know if the current price for a grave site should be charged. It was the opinion of the Council that the rate existing at the time of the purchase should be charged.

Olson, for the Roads Commission, told of a meeting he had had with Lyle Arends and Clerk Whisler during which the specs for road resurfacing had been drawn up. He announced that an ad for bids was currently running in the Brainerd Dispatch and the Construction Bulletin.

A discussion was held relative to mowing and brushing alongside the city roads, but no action was taken. Foss brought up the question as to why one outfit should charge \$16 for grading and another charge \$22 per hour. No satisfactory answer was given.

David Holker approached the Council with a request that an easement be granted for access to his property which is cut off by the wilderness trails property which had been leased to the City by the Corps of Engineers. He had asked for an easement from the Corps in 1971 but had been turned down because the Corps property had, at that time, been considered as a possible camp grounds site. On a motion by Andolshek and a second by Petersen, with all members voting "AYE", the Clerk was instructed to write to the Corps informing them that the City had no objection to the granting of the easement.

Olson again brought up the subject of maintaining Cross Ave. but, on the advice of the City Attorney, it was decided that the request not be acted on until some other litigations had been settled.

For the Ambulance Commission, Ed Horton stated that the crying need was still for drivers. It was announced that there would be another Advanced First Aid and Emergency Care Course, but this does not necessarily generate any more drivers. Foss announced that the Board of County Commissioners was conducting a survey to try to find some solution to the continuing ambulance problem. Mayor Fogelberg asked Mr. Foss to explore with the County Commissioners any possible answers.

Under the heading of a Parks Commission report, Don Engen of the Historical Society spoke about the 200' X 500' plot of ground across from the Corps of Engineers' Park. The City of Crosslake had asked for a lease from the Corps for the property, but it was decided that it would be more appropriate for the Historical Society to have the lease. On a motion by Foss and a second by Andolshek, with all members voting "AYE", the Council went on record as withdrawing their original resolution asking for the lease, so the way might be clear for the Historical Society to proceed with their request.

Under the heading of old business, Petersen moved with a second by Foss, all members voting "AYE", to adopt the nuisance ordinance discussed at previous meetings. The Clerk was instructed to take all necessary preliminary steps to legally adopt the ordinance.

Fire Chief Fraser reported on an open fire that had been started in the South Bay area which had been left smoldering, presenting a hazardous situation. Andolshek moved that the responsible party be assessed \$50, but withdrew her motion when it was decided to look into the legal angles of the situation before proceeding further.

In view of the fact that the fire department was proposing a different pay scale for meetings and calls, Councilman Foss spoke of amending the 1967 ordinance which supposedly gave the fire department members \$2.00 per call.

Robert Alderman, attorney from Brainerd, who had asked to be placed on the agenda did not appear but Harold Krieger from Rochester spoke for Alderman's clients (Sutherland and others) relative to the placement of trailers on the Bon Repoz property. There was then some discussion between Mr. Krieger and City Attorney Fritz. Mr. Krieger asked the City Attorney to send him a letter concerning the City's position in regard to the alleged ordinance violations ~~against Bon Repoz~~ sought by Sutherland.

Mayor Fogelberg stated that there had been a request from Jack Stone for permission to install a train ride on the Miniature Golf Course property. On a motion by Andolshek and a second by Foss, with all members voting "AYE", the matter was referred to the Planning Commission.

Foss reported on the businessmen's meeting which had been held at Echo Ridge and at which Duane Blanck, County Engineer, had spoken. Foss said that the plans for resurfacing Hwy. #6 would be at the drawing board stage around the 1st of December and that there would have to be three public hearings before the wheels would be set in motion. He anticipated that the work would not be starting until the latter part of 1977, and that work on the bridge spanning the channel between Cross and Daggett would not begin for perhaps another five years.)

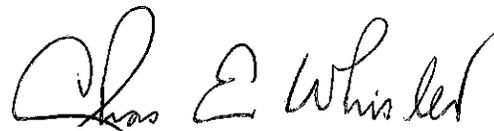

BE IT RESOLVED, that the City of Crosslake, Minn. withdraw the above mentioned application for lease of the property, and further

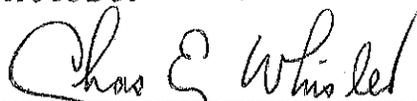
